Monthly meeting: The August meeting was held on a Tuesday daytime at the Tasmanian Arboretum with the guest speakers coming from within the Society and from the very top. APSTAS President Louise Skabo and Margaret Killen our membership officer.



Both ladies spoke about how the Society started out on the Mainland and then in Tasmania as the Society for Growing Australian Plants. Wonderful computer slides help tell the history and story of the changing over to become the Australian Plants Society Tasmania. Brief histories of the



three Tasmanian groups were also told with the Launceston group the most active at the moment.

Objectives of the Society past, present and into the future were talked about. How to keep existing members while encouraging new membership was a question posed. With society in general being 'time poor' gaining the interest of the public will be a key issue moving forward.

Plant table: Big thank you to Riitta and Jan B for the flowers and their written descriptions.

An excellent amount of flowering specimens were on show on the monthly plant table. All the plants came from Riitta and Jan's garden.

"I collected some of the more colourful winter flowering plants from our garden. One of the pleasures of growing Australian plants is that you have flowers all year round.





I had three Banksias: *B. menziesii*, *B. prionotes* the Acorn Banksia, and one of the modern miniature hybrids of *B. spinulosa*. I find these dwarf varieties look a bit unbalanced with bunches of very large flowers stuck on top a shrub barely half a meter. The common names for *B menziesii*, according to the wonderful Banksia book by Kevin and Kathy Collins, are Menzies' Banksia or Firewood Banksia. One would think that such a beautiful red flowering shrub would have deserved a more imaginative name.

Other plants on the table included red flowering shrubs *Kunzea baxteri* and *Calothamnus sanguineus*. Two Hakeas with white and creamy flowers. Tall upright *Hakea minyma*, and large rounded *Hakea rostrata*, the latter one has a wonderful perfume. It has a common name "Turkey gobblers" due to the shape of the fruit, the hard nuts. The two Correas were *Correa backhouseana*, and low growing "Fat Fred'. The two species of Adenanthos were *Adenanthos detmoldii* and *Adenanthos sericeus*, both purple foliaged and greyish green form. The *A. sericeus* become large shrubs.

Senna artemisioides and Phebalium squameum provided the yellow colours. Lysiosepalum involucratum has mauve flowers. It does not seem to have a common name, you just have to get your tongue around the botanical one. It is a low growing shrub, spreading a couple of meters wide. In our garden it flowers all year round with small drooping mauve flowers resembling Thomasia flowers. It is closely related to Thomasia and Lasiopetalum as well as Guichenotia. It is a very attractive shrub, but the best thing is that it does not get eaten by animals; even hungry wallabies do not seem to want to taste it.

The main attraction on the table was a branch from a shrubby form of Casuarina or Allocasuarina, unfortunately I cannot any more identify the exact species of the several shrubby forms we grow, some Tasmanian, but some mainlanders. They do not have labels. As we live on the coast, we have the local Tasmanian trees: *Allocasuarina littoralis, verticillata* and *duncanii*. We also have the mainland *Casuarina torulosa*, purple drooping foliage and very thick brown corky bark.

My favourites are the shrubby Casuarinas or Allocasuarinas, but find it very hard to tell all of them apart. The main attraction was a branch from a medium straggly shrub with no distinct trunk. Casuarinas have often male and female flowers on separate plants. This one has the female flowers, small red tufts along the stems. When backlit by the sun they shine like red jewels. Our favourite book "Tasmania's natural flora", tells us that there are 70 species of Casuarina. Australia has 44 species and Tasmania has 7 species from genus Allocasuarina. The name Casuarina refers to the dense drooping branches resembling the drooping feathers of the Cassowary bird." Riitta B.
