MONTHLY MEETING:

Monthly meetings are back at the East Devonport Tennis club rooms, 48 Wright Street East Devonport. Once the business arising has been taken care of, it's either guest speaker or plant table time or both, all while having a cuppa and chatting to other members.

GUEST SPEAKER:

Petra Wilder, the President of Devonport Community Landcare (DCL) spoke about the need for community action to protect and enhance the natural environment in Devonport. This is especially important as large tracts of bushland are being cleared for development. DCL will be running community events from around June 2024 which include planting days, weeding and community education. The focus in 2024 is on assisting Devonport City Council with the management of Don Reserve and Kelcey Tier. Petra also spoke about opportunities to collaborate with APSTNW including growing some of the plants required for revegetation projects, possible grants and working together on community education sessions on local native plants. It was a very productive talk and DCL are looking forward to working with APSTNW in the near future.

PLANT TABLE:

Colour was varied from the garden of John Tabor:

Eremophila meringue isaac (Hybrid from *E. bignofolia* in a deep purple, and a clutch of Hybrid Grevilleas featuring peaches and cream and a deep red Ned Kelly. Melaleucas included a deep purple *M. radula*, the small *M. thymifolia*, and a red *M.fulgens*.

Beaufortia sparsa in bright orange was also in the spectrum.

Riitta brought an unusual Adenanthos with dark reddish colouring on the leaves and the characteristic tiny red flower (*A. sericeus*); a *Banksia spinulosa*, unusual for the colouring of the stamens; the lacy-looking *Acacia aphylla* and *Lambertia uniflora*, so different from the clusters of flowers of *L.formosa*.

Ian, down to earth, had a variety of small daisies: *Brachyscome beridifolia* (Swan River daisy), and *Schoenia filifolia* (snowy everlasting daisy).





Finally, *Rhodanthus Chlorocephala ssp rosea* (rosy everlasting daisy) which grows naturally in W.A. In cultivation, this native Australian daisy belonging to the family Asteraceae is widely grown due to its attractive flowers and foliage, and because it is hardy, adaptable and provides a good, fast ground cover. The flowers are long-lived and dry well.

Growing a little higher and in contrasting brown was the sand-hill sword sedge *Lepidosperma concavum*. Naturally, Ian's signature Billy Buttons (*Pycnosorus globosus*) were on the table also.
